GOODWILL NOW SELLS ONLINE

Buyers can pick up good bargains, help the nonprofit

GREENSBORO — An antique chamber pot. A gold watch from the turn of the century. A Hillary Clinton nutcracker — patent pending — still in its box. These are just a few examples of rare, antique or collectible items that occasionally turn up at local Goodwill stores. And when they do, buyers can bid on them through the on-line auction site, www.shopgoodwill.com.

A buyer in Florida recently snatched up a mechanical tyrannosaurus for \$400. The large animal moves when activated. The nutcracker, about the size of a Barbie doll, sold for about \$15 to someone locally. It's exactly the type of item Cathy Lamb loves to come across. She manages the local shop-goodwill website. Some of the items ready to ship this week include a set of 'N Sync dolls and a pair of Tony Llama cowboy boots.

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John Stephens pulls items that have recently sold online to be packed for shipping. The local Goodwill stores generate about \$30,000 in online sales each month.

Gingrich tries to slow GOP rival

■ With momentum swinging his way, Mitt Romney steps up attacks ahead of Tuesday's primary.

MIAMI — Newt Gingrich slammed GOP rival Mitt Romney on Sunday for the steady stream of attacks he likened to "carpet-bombing," trying to cut into the resurgent front-runner's lead in Florida in the dwindling hours before Tuesday's pivotal presidential primary. Surging ahead in polls, Romney kept the pressure on Gingrich, casting him at an appearance in South Florida as an influence peddler and continuing his heavy advertising blitz that questions the former House speaker's ethics. In what has become a wildly unpredictable race,

the momentum has swung back to Romney, staggered last weekend by Gingrich's victory in South Carolina. Romney has begun advertising in Nevada ahead of that state's caucuses next Saturday, illustrating the challenges ahead for Gingrich, who has pledged to push ahead no matter what happens in Florida. 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Conviction ruins innocent man's life

GREENSBORO — Greg Taylor lost more than the 6,149 days he spent in prison for a murder he didn't commit. He lost his marriage, the chance to watch his daughter grow up and get married, experiencing the birth of his first grandchild, his job, and unknown career advancements and joys of life. "He will never be the

same," said Christine Mumma, executive director of the N.C. Center on Actual Innocence, and one of the people who helped the Greensboro native win his freedom in 2010. "He will never be whole again. The Greg Taylor that could have been will never exist." On Sunday morning, Mumma and Taylor retold the story of how an in-

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
